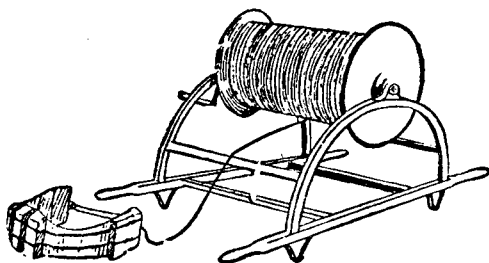

# Thirteenth Annual Report and Financial Statement

To be presented at the Annual General Meeting to be held at 7.30 p.m.  
SATURDAY, OCTOBER 20th, 1945.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

In submitting for your review the Thirteenth Annual Report and Financial Statement of the Association your Council places on record its appreciation of the efforts of District Associations and Clubs during the past season, and though operations were carried out, in most cases under difficult circumstances, the result of the years activities is one of which all concerned may well be proud and it is a clear indication that good progress has been made in spite of nearly six years of war.

The various matters dealt with during the year will be shown herein under separate headings.

## HIS MAJESTY KING GEORGE VI.

We record the continued interest of His Majesty King George VI. in the operations of the R.L.S.S. and Surf Association.

We reaffirm our loyalty to the Crown and express the hope that both His Majesty and Queen Elizabeth will long be spared to reign over Their Empire.

## V.E. AND V.J. DAYS.

The Victory gained by the Allied Forces in Europe in May last which was to be so quickly followed by Victory in the Pacific is a matter for rejoicing by all.

At this stage it is appropriate to record two motions at a Council meeting held subsequent to the cessation of hostilities in Europe.

(1) "The New Zealand Surf Life-Saving Association records its heartfelt gratitude at the cessation of hostilities in Europe and rejoices in the magnificent victory gained by the Allies. The crushing of an evil and inhuman foe is a triumph of right over might and our gratification can best be expressed by a determination to maintain and uphold the traditions for which this war has been fought.

We pay our humble tribute to the fighting qualities of Great Britain and her Dominion's gallant forces, and her Allies, and mourn with others, the loss of so many brave men. May their sacrifice strengthen us in our resolve to continue the struggle until peace is finally won."

(2) "The Council of the New Zealand Surf Life-Saving Association on behalf of its members, extend to the 2nd New Zealand Division their profound admiration and congratulations on the brilliant part it played and the notable achievements it rendered on assisting the Allies to victory.

"The valiant and heroic deeds of the Division have thrilled the people of this Dominion and the reputation they have earned has merited the high approbations accorded to it from all sources. The outstanding leadership of Lieutenant-General Freyberg is of particular interest to the members of our Association and fills us with pride, as does the part so nobly played by our members many of whom have paid the Supreme Sacrifice.

"We look forward with confidence to final victory firm in the belief that the Division will continue to add to its prestige.

"We are conscious of our part in assisting that victory."

A letter of congratulations was forwarded to Lieutenant-General Sir Bernard Freyberg.

We here record our further pleasure of the fact that His Majesty The King has been graciously pleased to appoint Lieutenant-General Sir Bernard Freyberg as the next Governor-General of New Zealand. An honour that all New Zealanders will feel proud of and rejoice in the fact that the services of such a distinguished leader have been so meritoriously rewarded.

### ACTIVE SERVICE AT HOME AND OVERSEAS.

The Council again places on record, on behalf of the Association its appreciation of the fact that in all phases of war activity, whether on land, sea or in the air, members of our Clubs have continued to operate in many parts of the world.

The Roll of Honour discloses that further members have made the Supreme Sacrifice. To their relations we tender sincere sympathy in their great loss.

To those who have been repatriated from prison camps we extend our heartiest congratulations with every good wish for a speedy reunion with their loved ones and a return to health.

At a later stage will be recorded additional names of those serving in the Forces.

### PATROL DUTIES.

Hours of Patrol .....36,823

Despite the further inroads made upon the numerical strength of Club Membership during the past year long hours of patrol have been undertaken, often under the greatest difficulty, and Clubs which had curtailed their activities in earlier years of war, have in many cases resumed some of their work, this has been done by enrolling younger members. It is to be hoped that when those who were interested in Surf Life-Saving return from the war, they will find still in existence active Clubs anxious to welcome them, and to which they will again be able to give their support.

The Council extends its appreciation to the Clubs and Members for the work they have done during the past season, with special mention of the outstanding work of the ladies and junior teams who have so ably assisted in maintaining that necessary high standard of efficiency and thus carry out one of the obligations of the Association.

### REHABILITATION.

The Council set up a Sub-Committee consisting of Messrs. C. R. Riordan (Convenor), M. G. Adams and L. Tointon on Rehabilitation of Discharged Servicemen into the activities of Clubs affiliated with the New Zealand Surf Life-Saving Association (Inc.).

The report submitted by the sub-committee was considered to be of a very high standard and the possible results were deemed to be almost unlimited. The report was duplicated and distributed to all Clubs with an earnest request to all members to read, digest and adopt a slogan of "DO IT NOW."

The Council sincerely hopes that members will on every possible occasion put into operation the worthy suggestions made in this report,

## RESIGNATION OF GENERAL SECRETARY.

### AN APPRECIATION.

During the year the Council suffered a very severe loss when the General Secretary (N. A. Ingram) intimated that owing to ill-health it was necessary for him to resign his position one which he had held with honour and distinction.

Since the inception of the N.Z.S.L.S.A. in 1932 Mr. Ingram had been associated with it, first as a delegate representing the Wellington Association and then from 1935 as General Secretary. He also was a member of the special committee that drafted the original constitution.

It will be pleasing to all members to know that it was possible to find him a place on the Council as assistant Registrar of publicity, thus retaining the benefit of his experience to the Council and we hope for him an interest in work that he has loved and done so well.

On behalf of all members the Council join in wishing him a speedy return to health.

The Council recommends that at the General Meeting an Honorary Life Membership of the Association be conferred on Mr. N. A. Ingram.

### GEAR.

The supply of Life Saving Gear has been maintained during the year covering urgent requirements.

Your Council was able with the assistance of the Government to obtain a supply of cotton life lines, which were and still are in extremely short supply, and the position of cotton is not likely to improve for some considerable time. It is suggested that District Associations should avail themselves of stocks of lines, thus assisting their Clubs and the Council in reducing the liability covering this life line stock.

Surf belts have been supplied during the year against requirements. While cork has been in short supply we anticipate supplies of life belts for the coming season will be available.

Standard life saving reels have been made by District Associations from drawings and patterns supplied by the Council.

Surf ski's for life saving purposes. Considerable time has been spent by the Council in correlating the information supplied by Australia, and the very valuable work carried out by the Auckland District Association in modifying the Australian ski to suit New Zealand surf conditions. Your Council has placed an order for a complete New Zealand type ski, which we trust will be available for inspection at the annual meeting.

The future requirements of standard life saving gear will no doubt require consideration by your Council, as now hostilities have ceased Clubs will in the near future become active again, and their life saving gear and equipment will require a complete check and overhaul.

## EXAMINATIONS HELD IN GERMANY BY PRISONERS OF WAR AT STALAG 383.

The Council wishes to specially place on record the wonderful results of the R.L.S.S. achieved in encouraging such a large number of prisoners of war, representative of the whole of the British Empire, to gain the Intermediate Certificate, and Bronze Medallion Award.

It was particularly pleasing to find that a New Zealander, Captain J. Crawford, N.Z.D.C. held the distinguished position of president of the life-saving club formed and that the names of so many New Zealanders appeared in the lists of successful candidates.

The list contains some 270 names, representing every portion of the British Empire and sixteen of these are New Zealanders.

## NEW ZEALAND SURF LIFE SAVING ASSOCIATION ANNUAL REPORT.

### LONDON TROPHY COMPETITION.

In submitting my report for the ninth year of competition I regret to say that it is very disappointing to record that only three districts fulfilled their obligations in sending in Club returns.

The general secretary made several requests to districts to ask Clubs to send their returns and we delayed the finalising of the competition to give Clubs every opportunity to get their returns in.

Club returns are very vital to the Association as they provide the only record of the work of the Clubs during the season. In this regard I feel that the Council should take the necessary measures to see that Club returns are furnished by all affiliated Clubs.

I desire to suggest to the Association that March 31st be given a trial as the date for filling in Club returns, seasonal activities on the beaches are practically finished and secretaries would probably attend to this matter before going into winter recess.

As the attached detailed summary shows the competition was won by Wellington, followed by Canterbury and Auckland. These three districts are to be congratulated for their efforts.

Although awards show a reduction on last year, which was a record one in two directions, namely, surf medallions and surf instructors, when one realises that this year from the returns available, 74 surf medallions and 9 surf instructors were gained and that these were nearly all issued to juniors, one feels that the future for our movement looks bright.

Now that the World War is over and we can look forward to the easing of the difficulties and restrictions under which our Association worked we should go forward from strength to strength.

In conclusion may I add that the donors of the trophy, the Royal Life Saving Society, London, can rest assured that we do appreciate their encouragement of our efforts to stimulate and spread the knowledge of Surf Life Saving.

### ANNUAL RETURNS.

Only 22 clubs furnished annual return forms. The Council regrets that more clubs have not answered the numerous requests to submit returns promptly and it seems that a change of date for submitting returns may be advisable in future as this is work that could easily be finalised at the end of the season activities.

### N.Z. SURF LIFE-SAVING SENIOR MEN'S (WARTIME) LADIES' AND JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIPS.

The 1945 series of National Championships were conducted by the Otago District Surf Association on behalf of the Council, and although adverse weather and extreme surf conditions prevailing on the two days of the championships made it impossible to finalise all the Championship events great credit is due to the Otago Association and its officials for the excellent manner in which all arrangements were completed for a most successful meeting.

The work of the Otago secretary for the National Championships, Mr. B. T. Simeson was excellent and his interest and work for competitors and officials alike is here appreciated.

The following Clubs were represented with teams: Waitemata (Auckland), Fitzroy (Taranaki), Wellington Ladies', Titahi Bay, Island Bay. Maranui (Wellington), North Beach, New Brighton, South Brighton (Canterbury), St. Kilda, St. Clair, Balclutha (Otago), Total 12.

The following clubs were represented in individual events: Lyall Bay (Wellington), Taylor's Mistake (Canterbury), total 2.

The grand total of 14 clubs represented at the championships is excellent when it is remembered that just prior to the series there were doubts as to the railway connections in both Islands and this aspect coupled with the long distances to be travelled by the Northern Clubs gives indication of the continued interest of surf life-saving clubs and their district associations in these National Championships.
