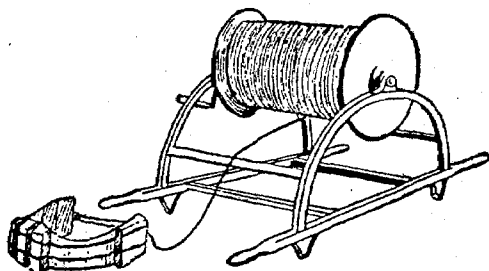

**HIS LATE MAJESTY KING GEORGE V.**

We, in common with kindred organisations throughout the British Commonwealth, mourn the passing of our beloved Monarch, and the sympathy of the Association was forwarded to The Right Hon. The Prime Minister of the Dominion by your President, and an acknowledgment has been received. His late Majesty was keenly interested in the efforts of life-saving at all times through his long reign.

**HIS MAJESTY KING EDWARD VIII.**

Members of the Association have pleasant recollections of His Majesty's visit to the Dominion of New Zealand and the keen interest he displayed in our work, and has already indicated his desire to continue the association of the Crown with the Royal Life-Saving Society. In pledging our loyalty to the King may we express the hope that his reign will be long and a happy one.

## RESCUES.

The number of Clubs in the Dominion is 56, and whilst returns have not been received from all these Clubs in time for this report, the number of rescues during the past season shows unmistakably the great value of the operations of Surf Life-Saving Clubs to the Dominion.

The above returns are from 32 Clubs.

The total number of rescues performed by these Clubs alone since their inception has been 1,799—truly a great monument to the work of the members of Surf Life-Saving Clubs who, without any desire of reward and oft-times at great personal risk, help to save those in difficulties. VIGILANCE—SERVICE—ENDURANCE is their slogan, and worthily these traditions are upheld.

## GOVERNMENT ASSISTANCE.

The Council records with extreme pleasure the donation of £100 from the Government from the proceeds of one of the Art Unions. Grants were made to the District Associations to be expended in furthering the work of Surf Life-Saving. With the growing importance of the activities of Surf Life-Saving Clubs to the community it is felt that an effort should be made to receive an annual grant from the Government for the purpose of educational propaganda. The members of Surf Clubs are doing excellent work in patrolling the beaches of the Dominion in the interests of bathers and visitors. The loss of valuable lives, by drowning, in the Dominion is heavy, but is undoubtedly reduced by the alert actions of Club members as disclosed under the paragraph dealing with RESCUES. Your Council feels confident that the Hon. Minister of Internal Affairs (Hon. W. E. Parry, M.P.) is fully alive to the important work done by Surf Clubs, and will see that this work receives its due consideration, both financially and otherwise. Much has been done to educate the people; much remains to be done. Finances are required to do this work of Life-Saving. In the matter of financial assistance the whole burden should not be borne by the State, but Local Bodies as well as individuals should shoulder their fair share of responsibility in the matter. The tramway finances of many districts have benefited considerably by the fact that Surf Clubs are actively working on their beaches and that surf life-saving competitions are held there. An annual donation from such Councils would be of great assistance to the organisation and a definite indication of the interest of the Local Body. Opportunity is also given to the individual citizen to show his appreciation of what is being done to ensure the safety of our beaches, and an opportunity is afforded in this report to indicate the desire to render financial assistance to the organisation in its work.

## AFFILIATIONS.

The following District Associations are affiliated:—Auckland, Taranaki, Manawatu, Wanganui, Wellington, Canterbury, and Otago. Total, 7 Associations. In addition, the Te Awa Club

and Porangahau Club (Hawke's Bay) are affiliated as individual clubs.

### OFFICIAL HANDBOOK.

By the publication in February of the 110-page Official Handbook of the Association a definite step in organisation was reached, and the thanks of the Association are extended to the Publicity Committee set up last year to undertake the heavy task of compiling the Handbook. To Messrs. F. Chapman, A. H. Ross, N. A. Ingram, P. D. Edwards and H. Dickson thanks are extended, and the Council appeals to members of Surf Life-Saving Clubs to purchase the Handbook early. The book is complete with diagrams, and an excellent production. The Council desires to take this opportunity of expressing its appreciation of the action of the A.S.L.S. Association in permitting the Committee to use a portion of its own handbook in the compilation of the N.Z. Handbook. The Council appreciates the many congratulations received in the publishing of the Handbook.

### PATROL COSTUMES.

The Association has adopted a definite costume for Patrol work exclusively, and no doubt the blue costume with three white diagonal stripes will be well known on the beaches of the Dominion as an emblem of readiness on the part of the members of Surf Life-Saving Clubs to render assistance and advice to the people who frequent the beaches. The Council hopes that all Clubs during the coming season will avail themselves of the use of the patrol costumes.

### CALL FOR MEDICAL ASSISTANCE.

By arrangement with the New Zealand Branch of the British Medical Association a system of call for medical assistance on the beaches has been brought into operation. Members of Surf Clubs who desire the urgent attendance of a medical practitioner (who may be on the beach or in close proximity) to attend a case need only to fly the Yellow Ensign from the flagpole or post of the clubhouse to secure the necessary assistance—if at hand. The thanks of the Association are extended to the medical fraternity for their ready co-operation in this matter.

### NEW ZEALAND SURF LIFE-SAVING CHAMPIONSHIPS, 1936.

The 1936 N.Z. Surf Life-Saving Championships were conducted by the Otago Surf Life-Saving Association in conjunction with the Council. The Championships were held on the St. Clair Beach, Dunedin, on February 22nd and 23rd, and congratulations are extended to the Otago Association on the management of same, and sincere thanks are extended to the many officials who did so much to secure the success achieved. Due no doubt to the long distances to travel and the necessary large expenditure involved in such travelling, the number of teams competing fell far short of the previous two Championships. The standard of efficiency reached by the various competing teams was high. Teams were present representing the Taranaki, Wellington, Canterbury and Otago District Associations. The entrance of teams from Canterbury created considerable interest and great pleasure to the Council and to the Otago Association. The following are the results of the Championship events:—

N.Z. Junior Individual Surf Race Championship.—Mr. S. W. Jarvis, St. Clair Club (Otago).

N.Z. Four Man Alarm Championship.—Lyall Bay (Wellington).

Congratulations are extended to the winners of the various Championship events. To the 1936 N.Z. Champion Beltman (Mr. A. T. Dalton), of the North Beach Club, Canterbury, we offer hearty congratulations.

The Council desires to take this opportunity of expressing its appreciation and thanks to the many sub-committees that operated at Dunedin prior to and during the period of the Championships for the great amount of work done to ensure the success secured. For the reception accorded and the hospitality extended to the officials and teams by the Otago Association and its members, sincerest thanks and appreciation are here extended.

#### **OFFICIALS AT N.Z. SURF LIFE-SAVING CHAMPIONSHIPS.**

In this paragraph of its report the Council desires to express the keenest appreciation of the services rendered by the Hon. Judges, Referee, Marshal, Hon. Timekeepers, Assistant Marshal, Call Stewards, Arena Stewards, Starter, and all other officials who worked so efficiently to secure the success of the Championships.

#### **HON. NATIONAL BOARD OF JUDGES.**

The Board is now an established fact, and the Association looks forward with expectations to the future that the judging at the National Championships will be conducted under a standardised system of judging which will be of paramount importance. The members of the National Board of Judges have spent considerable time during the year and met twice at Dunedin during the currency of the Championships, and at the termination of which a summary of the opinions of the members of the Board was circulated to competing teams, and will prove of value to teams competing in future Championship events. The Board desires to place before you at this meeting several amendments to its present constitution, and also to methods of drill, etc., and these amendments will be found in the Agenda Paper. The thanks of the Council are extended to Messrs. P. D. Edwards (Chairman), N. Berge (Taranaki), R. G. Howell (Taranaki), W. H. Gerrie (Wellington), S. Higgins (Auckland), and J. F. Alexander (Southland) for the valuable work they have done in instituting the National Board of Judges, and

confidently leaves its administration in their hands. Very complimentary references were made of the standard of the judging at Dunedin.

#### **N.Z. FEDERATION OF SWIMMING AND LIFE-SAVING.**

Recognising the value of unified action of the National Bodies of the N.Z. Amateur Swimming Association, Dominion Council, R.L.S.S., and the N.Z. Surf Life-Saving Association in approaching the Government or Local Bodies on matters favourable to the advancement of the ideals of these kindred organisations—such action being endorsed by the Hon. Minister of Internal Affairs (Hon. W. E. Parry, M.P.) and to a large degree emanating from him—your Council has submitted a proposal of Federation to the other two National Organisations mentioned, and the matter is now under consideration, and it is hoped that during the time of the Annual General Meeting that a conference will be held and the proposal finalised, and that The N.Z. Federation of Swimming and Life-Saving will become an accomplished fact, and its future, on behalf of the three organisations, will be watched with keen interest. It is well to remind members that the adoption of the proposal in no way affects the domestic administration of either of the three parties. The approach to the Government or any Local Body will be strengthened by the number represented by the Federation. There is scope for its operations, and the Council hopes that its efforts will culminate in the formation of a National Organisation worthy to uphold the ideals of its constitutive members. The Council has appointed Messrs. P. F. Coira, F. H. Jackson, and N. A. Ingram to represent it at the Conference.

#### **N.Z. CENTENNIAL SURF LIFE-SAVING CHAMPIONSHIPS.**

Acting on instructions from the last annual general meeting, your Council has given this matter due consideration. Realising the great importance of the year 1940 to the Dominion and the decision already arrived at to hold a National Exhibition at Wellington as one of the main features of the centennial year, your Council considers that every effort should be made to make the N.Z. Surf Life-Saving Championships of that year one of outstanding brilliance, and that an invitation be extended to the A.S.L.S.A. to send two teams to compete. Recognising further that more than the usual period of time should be permitted the Council and the District Association concerned to finalise matters, the Council recommends the allocation of the 1940 Championships (centennial year) to the Wellington District Association. In recommending Wellington as the venue of the Centennial Championships the Council has no desire to forward the claims of Wellington, but in view of the holding of the National Exhibition at this Centre, and on a location adjacent to the most suitable beach in the district, then it is obvious that the Association's claim for financial assistance from the fund to be established by the Government for the Centennial celebrations is strengthened. The central position of the Capital City is another factor in the effort to make the number of entering teams a record. This proposal will not preclude the right of other District Associations to receive a visit from the Australian teams, for provision would be made to undertake an extensive tour of the Dominion. The Council hopes that a definite decision will be reached as to the location of the Centennial Surf Championships, for the importance of an early decision is readily appreciated.



## VISIT OF AUSTRALIAN SURF LIFE-SAVING TEAM.

Intimation was received from the A.S.L.S. Association asking whether the Council would consider the receiving of an Australian Surf team to visit the Dominion in 1937. This request has received considerable attention by your Council, as it is recognised that such an educational tour would be of inestimable advantage to the Surf Clubs and to the general public. Every effort is being made to finalise matters, and it is hoped to submit a report in detail to the Annual General Meeting. An itinerary including both Islands has been submitted to the District Associations, with a summary of necessary guarantees to be forthcoming to permit of the sanctioning of the tour. The team will consist of eight members, and will certainly create Dominion-wide interest. This tour will no doubt be the forerunner of others, and opens up the possibility of sending a New Zealand team to Australia in 1938 for the British Empire Games.

## THE LONDON TROPHY.

During the visit of Mr. H. H. Lock, of the Central Executive (London) R.L.S.S., to the Dominion last year, an intimation was given that the Central Executive desired to donate a trophy for competition among the District Surf Associations of the Dominion, and to be known as "The London Trophy." Mr. Lock, in making the announcement, said that the Central Executive desired the trophy to be accepted as a gesture of goodwill to the N.Z. Surf Life-Saving Association. A set of rules compiled by Messrs. V. Allen and N. A. Ingram have been adopted, and the first competition is now in operation, and will conclude on June 30th, 1937. "The London Trophy" has arrived, and will be on view at this meeting. It is an excellent addition to the trophies under the control of the Association. The Council feels confident that the competition will arouse the keenest interest among the districts, and will remain as a definite bond between the Central Executive and the Surf Associations of the Dominion. Mr. V. Allen has been appointed to conduct the competition on behalf of the Council. The thanks of the N.Z. Surf Life-Saving Association are here extended to the Central Executive, R.L.S.S., for its magnificent gift.

## FINANCES.

The Financial Statement is here attached for your consideration, and gives an indication of the widening efforts of the organisation during the past year. Whilst desirous of still furthering the work in the districts of the Dominion, the Council was restrained, largely due to the lack of adequate finances. It is hoped that the coming years will indicate, by increasing revenue, the appreciation of the Government, Local Bodies and citizens in the work of the Association. It is pleasing to note the purchasing through the Council of the standardised reels, belts and lines by the Clubs. The securing of a large number of the new Handbooks was a heavy item of expenditure during the year, and it is hoped that members of Clubs will early purchase the books this year, and thus help the Council to reimburse itself on this outlay.

The major item in the year's loss is on account of the heavy expense in paying the expenses of judges and officials to Dunedin to control the New Zealand Championships. As the Council considers that the Championships should be financially self-supporting, it is recommended that the percentage of receipts to which the Council is entitled should be increased.

To our Hon. Treasurer (Mr. F. H. Jackson) sincerest thanks are here extended for the excellent work that he has done during the year.

#### **AFFILIATION WITH THE OLYMPIC AND BRITISH EMPIRE GAMES ASSOCIATION.**

Recognising the value of co-operative efforts in all manner of sports, your Council has given the above matter due consideration, and recommends this Annual General Meeting to seek affiliation with the Olympic and British Empire Games Association.

#### **CARRIAGE OF REELS ON TRAINS, ETC.**

The Council approached the Railway Department in an endeavour to secure a reduction on the railage charges on surf reels made by the Association, and it is pleasing to record that the Department has granted very satisfactory concessions, and the thanks of the Association are herewith extended to the Department for its action.

#### **COUNCIL'S DELEGATE ON DOMINION COUNCIL, R.L.S.S.**

The Council expresses its thanks to Mr. C. Riordan for his services as its representative, and trusts that he will be again available to act as our representative.

#### **DISTRICT ASSOCIATION'S BOUNDARIES.**

The matter of defining District Surf Association's boundaries has not been finalised, for in view of the possible formation of an Association on the East Coast of the North Island, the suggested formation of a District Association on the West Coast of the South Island, and the possible readjustment of the Wanganui and Manawatu District Associations, your Council considers that the matter should be still further deferred.

#### **HONOUR CONFERRED ON OUR HON. MEDICAL ADVISER.**

The Council records with pleasure the conferring of a Knighthood on one of our Medical Advisers, and congratulates Sir James S. Elliott, K.C.M.G., on the recognition received from His Majesty the King. Sir James's interest in cancer research and other humanitarian work is well known, and we feel proud to have him associated with our organisation.

#### **WORK OF GEAR COMMITTEE.**

The Council desires to place on record its keen appreciation of the work of the Gear Committee (Convener, Mr. A. H. Ross). The final standardisation of the gear now adopted by the Association meant a great deal of work by the Committee.

#### **COUNCIL'S REPRESENTATIVE ON THE A.S.L.S. ASSOCIATION.**

In appreciation of the excellent services rendered to the cause of Surf Life-Saving in the Dominion, the Council recommended to the A.S.L.S.A. to accept Mr. S. Creeth Sidford, of Auckland, as the Council's representative on the Australian Surf Association Council during his stay in Sydney. The recommendation was adopted, and Mr. Sidford is now acting as our representative, and will, no doubt, with his great knowledge of local conditions, be of great assistance in the matter of discussing of tours, etc.

## MEETINGS.

During the year the following meetings were held:—Full Council, 9; Executive Committee (instituted 8/1/1936), 8; and the following record of attendances gives indication of the keen interest displayed by the Councillors on behalf of the organisation:—Messrs. Dighton, 6; appointed 12th February, 1936, W. H. Fulford, 5; appointed 12th February, 1936, E. B. Hughes, 4, proxy for Mr. F. Chapman; N. A. Ingram, 9. The foregoing meetings were of the full Council.

To the Maranui Surf Life-Saving Club thanks are extended for the use of the Clubroom for meetings of the Council, and to Mr. W. J. Beveridge for the use of his office for meetings of the Executive Committee.

To the Press of the Dominion sincerest thanks are here accorded for the consideration shown to the Association's activities throughout the Dominion and the help accorded.

To the Hon. Auditor (Mr. W. H. Fulford) thanks are extended for the services he has rendered.

## DOMINION COUNCIL, R.L.S.S. AND N.Z.A.S.A.

Before concluding its report the Council places on record its appreciation of the spirit of goodwill and desire to assist whenever possible shown by the Dominion Council, R.L.S.S. and the Council of the N.Z.A.S.A. The relationships during the year have been mutually beneficial, and a spirit of genuine co-operation has been manifested as between the three organisations.

## OBITUARY.

It is with deep regret that the Council records the passing of the Chief Secretary of The Royal Life-Saving Society (London), the late Mr. S. J. Monks. The progress of the R.L.S.S. is closely associated with the name of the late Chief Secretary, who for a lengthy period of years devoted himself to the advancement of the cause. We regret that in 1935 his then failing health would not permit his visiting of the Dominion. To his widow and family we tender sincerest sympathy in their great loss, and to the Central Executive, R.L.S.S., we express regret at its losing such a notable worker in the cause of Life-Saving.

## CONCLUSION.

In concluding this report, the Council feels justified in assuming that the past season can be credited as one of progress in its various activities and the consolidating of many efforts made since its inception. That the organisation is meeting with the general approval of the public can be gauged by the increasing attendances

at beaches to witness displays by Surf Life-Saving Clubs and competitions between Clubs and Districts. A deal of organising work has yet to be accomplished, but viewing the short period of time since the inception of the Association, gratification can be expressed at the progress already made. With the continued interest and energy of members appointed to the Council of the Association to represent District Associations and the active co-operation of Surf Life-Saving Club members, then the future can be looked forward to with expectations of the functioning of an organisation worthy to take its place with its much older kindred organisation, the A.S.L.S.A.

To the members of Surf Life-Saving Clubs throughout the Dominion we commend the motto of the Association: "VIGILANCE, SECURITY, ENDURANCE, and whilst thanking them for the work that they have done, and are doing, appeal for the continuance of their loyalty to the Association and its ideals.
