Chairman's Report

Another season departs, another one looms on the horizon. As the summers pass, each one seems more precious, particularly in a year in which our movement lost some valuable and passionate characters.

But life is, without doubt, relentless. Each void in surf lifesaving - no matter how deep - seems to fill quickly with the vigour and dedication of new energy.

I was reminded of that again recently, seeing both the previous and current intakes of our BP Leaders for Life programme, watching some of our incredible volunteers win deserved recognition at our regional awards ceremonies and viewing it first-hand on the beaches we patrol.

It is humbling and intensely rewarding to know that not only are we replaceable but the next generation are likely to take the culture and inclusiveness of our movement to places we can only dream of.

Our 18,831 members play an incredible role in New Zealand society, particularly the 4,903 lifeguards who keep our communities safe in and around New Zealand's favourite playground.

Collectively, we are absolutely driven to make sure there are no preventable drownings on our beaches which remains something I will always be extremely proud of.

That commitment is particularly admirable at a time when society is changing so fundamentally. We are increasingly time-poor and volunteering has changed drastically in the time I've been involved in surf lifesaving.

Episodic volunteering is now much more common; where volunteers come into the organisation, spend time with their children, develop as lifeguards, spend five to 10 years keeping our communities safe and then move on to other opportunities and challenges in their lives.

It changes our membership demographic but it also makes it even more important to bed in ideals of diversity - gender, ethnicity and especially thinking - to drive our culture into the future. Organizationally we must lead this and diversity and cultural change must come through our local and national committees, through our staff and up to our board.

The role of your board is to provide governance for the movement, to equip staff and volunteers alike with a clear strategic direction and to this end your board is looking to reset its strategy map, to become more aspirational while, at the same time, developing and imbedding a high performing culture across the organization.

To do this, we need to stretch the organisation to be the best as it can be, to ensure we are delivering core service to the highest standards for our members and communities.

This will support and drive growth, making sure we not only retain and encourage volunteers but that we remain relevant and make sure that being a lifeguard carries the mana it deserves.

Our partnership with Water Safety New Zealand, Coastguard, Swimming New Zealand and the SAR Sector remains strong, which see's Surf Life Saving New Zealand take a senior leadership role as we continue to engage with Government.

We continue to engage with Government on opportunities for long-term, sustainable funding in perpetuity and a significant amount of work has gone into those relationships. It's important we're in a position to deliver across the water safety sector, with a model that provides the best collective impact for the least cost and actually makes a difference to New Zealand society.

As always, I want to recognise and extend a special thanks to all our partners and supporters; and in particular TSB, DHL, BP, Toyota Financial Services, KFC and Zespri. All our partners provide not just financial but emotional and leverage support to the organisation and our mission while underpinning our sustainability and helping us show all New Zealanders the important work we do.

Our local and national lifeguard committees continue to work on a number of strategic initiatives. Again, the changing nature of society is a driver in this; changes to lifeguard qualifications, competition age categories, the type and the length of events are among pressing issues to solve.

We continually strive to innovate and improve, to build a culture of innovation and continuous improvement, all the while benchmarking ourselves against best practice and leveraging new technologies.

I love seeing the innovative solutions our clubs and members at the coal face continue to explore. They're using not only technological solutions but also good, old-fashioned creative thinking to support our goal of zero preventable drownings on New Zealand's beaches.

Supporting that are our lifeguarding leadership programmes, such as our intermediate lifeguard schools, the BP Leaders for Life programme and the national lifeguard school, which enable our most promising members to grow, develop and become world-class leaders within their respective fields.

Our staff, led by Chief Executive Paul Dalton, are there to support the membership and I'd like to thank them for their continued work and the difficult job they do on our behalf. And to you, the lifeguards, the volunteers, the club administrators and passionate clubbies - never underestimate how valuable your time is. You make our movement a vital, functioning part of New Zealand society and truly makes a difference.

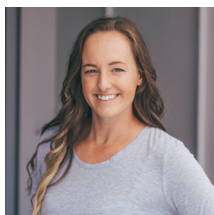

Chief Executive's Report

PAUL DALTON



The last year has been another positive one - again driven by some good summer weather and continuing to see progress in a number of areas important to the surf life saving movement.

As always my thanks go to all the staff and volunteers who put in the hard yards – it was a real pleasure to be part of the team for another year!

A few of the highlights for the year for me were:

- Successful delivery of our 'business as usual' regional programmes – providing frontline support for Clubs and Members in lifesaving, sport and club development areas.
- Completion of another year of the Regional Lifeguard programme – which contributes over 33% of the total national patrol hours. A big thanks once again to all our Council partners for the funding support.
- Further growth in membership, up to 18,831 and in patrol hours (up to 237,721), along with lifeguard numbers, retention rate and IRB drivers.

- It is interesting to note that while preventative actions were similar to last year, there were significant reductions in the number of rescues, assists and first aids, suggesting lifeguards were more effective in preventing people getting into trouble in the first place, which is our ultimate aim.
- Also pleasing was the growth in the number of newly qualified lifeguards and new IRB drivers contributing to a growth in the total number of both.
- Another busy and successful year on the domestic sporting front with continued strong participation numbers. Thanks go to all the clubs that hosted the events and all the officials, team managers and supporters for all their work in making it happen.
- The success of the Junior Black Fins and the NZ IRB team in winning their World Championships for the first time. These were tremendous achievements and the athletes and management deserved all the plaudits they received for their athlete-funded campaigns. And that is not to forget the Black Fins who came so very close to another back-to-back world title, only to miss out by a few points – again they put together another very strong campaign.
- Putting in place new high performance team management groups for the next two years leading up to the 2020 World Championships.
- A very enjoyable 2018 AGM, Club Chairs Strategy Workshop and Awards of Excellence dinner. A big thanks to the Honours & Awards committee, club attendees and everyone else who helped make that a successful day.

- Seeing members take home three awards, including the coveted 'Gold Award' at the annual NZ Search and Rescue awards.
- Another great BP Leaders for Life programme. Congratulations to the team of facilitators for the very professional way they run the programme and to the participants, who again demonstrated the future of the movement is in good hands.
- And in mentioning BP, it was very much appreciated that they repeated their 'Every Litre Counts' campaign which this time raised over \$200,000 for SLSNZ. A big thanks too for KFC who lifted their fundraising efforts to another level this year with over \$165,000 raised.
- A further three year extension to our long term partnership with DHL, and bringing Toyota Financial Services into the national family of sponsors after many years as a core supporter of SLS Northern Region.
- Receiving \$310,000 over the previous year's grant from NZLGB following a successful year for Lotto. This was very much appreciated and allowed us to continue on with additional club grants and a greater contribution to club insurance costs.
- Both of the above two factors contributing towards achieving a sixth year in a row of positive Net Profit results.
- Receiving a \$240,000 grant from the Astrolabe Trust to be used in 2019/20 to complete the Bay of Plenty radio network and a further \$200,000 for distribution to five Bay of Plenty clubs in 2018/19.
- Signing a memorandum of understanding with SLS Northern Region.
- Vivien Conway starting as our inaugural Board Youth intern.
- The new one page 'Strategy Map' that clearly sets out the priority activities for the organisation.
- The report from Volunteer NZ giving us some direction to future-proof the movement from the societal changes impacting volunteerism.
- Being part of the ongoing work of the Water Safety Sector, in particular the discussions with Central Government over sustainable long term funding for SLSNZ and the wider sector.
- Starting to take a fresh look at our Surf Education offerings, but in the meantime still running programmes that in 2018/19 had 31,728 primary school children taking part.

Overall, we continue to be in a good space, and while there is always room for improvement it's great to be on a sound footing to head into whatever the future may bring us.

On the flip side, I was saddened with the loss of two of our 'tall Totara' during the year – Board member Graham Crombie and former Chairman and ILS Board member Graeme Cullen. Both had been a real help to me in my time as CEO and will be sorely missed for the contribution they have made to the movement.

Looking at the financial results for the year.

Over the year, income grew by \$640,009 (6.2%) to \$10.992 million.

Grant income grew by some \$347,000, primarily due to an extra \$312,000 from NZLGB. Sponsorship revenue reduced by \$255,000 due to one-off factors from last year not repeating - the BP 50th anniversary of the partnership and the TSB rebranding. Programmes & Services grew by \$287,000 mainly due to additional funding from Councils for midweek lifeguard services and Fundraising increased by \$98,000 with growth across most areas of activity.

Expenditure increased by \$650,656 (6.5%) to \$10.606 million.

Club Support expenditure grew by \$489,000 – driven by an additional \$225,000 in grants to clubs, an additional \$61,000 on insurance and additional resources and associated overheads. Lifesaving expenditure increased by \$373,000 with more spent on midweek lifeguard services, coastal safety research, beach education, online learning development and resources. Spending on Income Generation dropped by \$367,000 as the 'one-off' TSB rebranding costs were not incurred this year and from some salary savings while a role was vacant for part of the year. Sport expenditure increased by \$120,000 due to this year being the bigger spending year of the 2 year high performance cycle with the World Championships taking place in Adelaide in late 2018.

Overall, with income and expenditure growing by a very similar amount, the Net Profit for the year at \$386,349 was virtually unchanged from last year.

This helps us to continue rebuilding the cash reserves that are so important to protect us against revenue shocks. We still have a long way to go, and in the short term we remain vulnerable, so must continue to work very hard in this area.

Finally as always I would like to thank all of the club members, lifeguards, parents, volunteers and administrators for the tremendous amount of work they put in, our fellow sports, charities and sector organisations that we work with closely on many issues, our funders and commercial partners for their ongoing support, and our many and varied other stakeholders for their roles in keeping surf life saving strong.

All of your efforts are greatly appreciated and I look forward to working with you again in the coming year.

SLSNZ Foundation

Established in 2016, the Surf Life Saving New Zealand Foundation is a fundraising arm of Surf Life Saving New Zealand (SLSNZ), focused on building a sustainable income stream to support surf life saving activities nationwide over the long term.

The Foundation is a separate legal entity from SLSNZ with trustees appointed by the SLSNZ Board.

The current trustees are SLSNZ Board Chairman Brent Warner, SLSNZ Board member Trevor Taylor, former SLSNZ Board member Joe Pope and long time lifeguard and SLSNZ Life Member Peter Fitzsimmons.

The Foundation aims to provide financial assistance to SLSNZ, its 74 member clubs and or other SLSNZ entities to enable them to carry out surf life saving activities in New Zealand for the benefit of the public.

The Foundation is very flexible with the type of support people can provide and allowing this to be targeted to particular areas and activities of the donor's interest if that is their preference. The types of support may include:

- Cash.
- Pledges.
- Publicly traded securities.
- Bequests (planned giving).
- Real estate.
- Other income producing assets.
- Art, jewellery, and collectables.
- A loan (of money or other assets to the Foundation enabling it to earn tax free income. After a specified time, the capital would be returned to the lender).

Bequests are a particular focus for the Foundation, as these are a simple but very effective way for people to make a significant contribution to something they believe in.

People often have specific areas of interest that they would like to support, and the Foundation can arrange and oversee this. Those who want to create a long term legacy have the option to elect that their gift will be kept in perpetuity, with only the income earned from it being distributed. Others may want to see their donation used for a particular activity, item, club or geographical location. All is possible.

As such, a club could use the SLSNZ Foundation as a repository for their funds without having to go through the process of establishing their own trust.

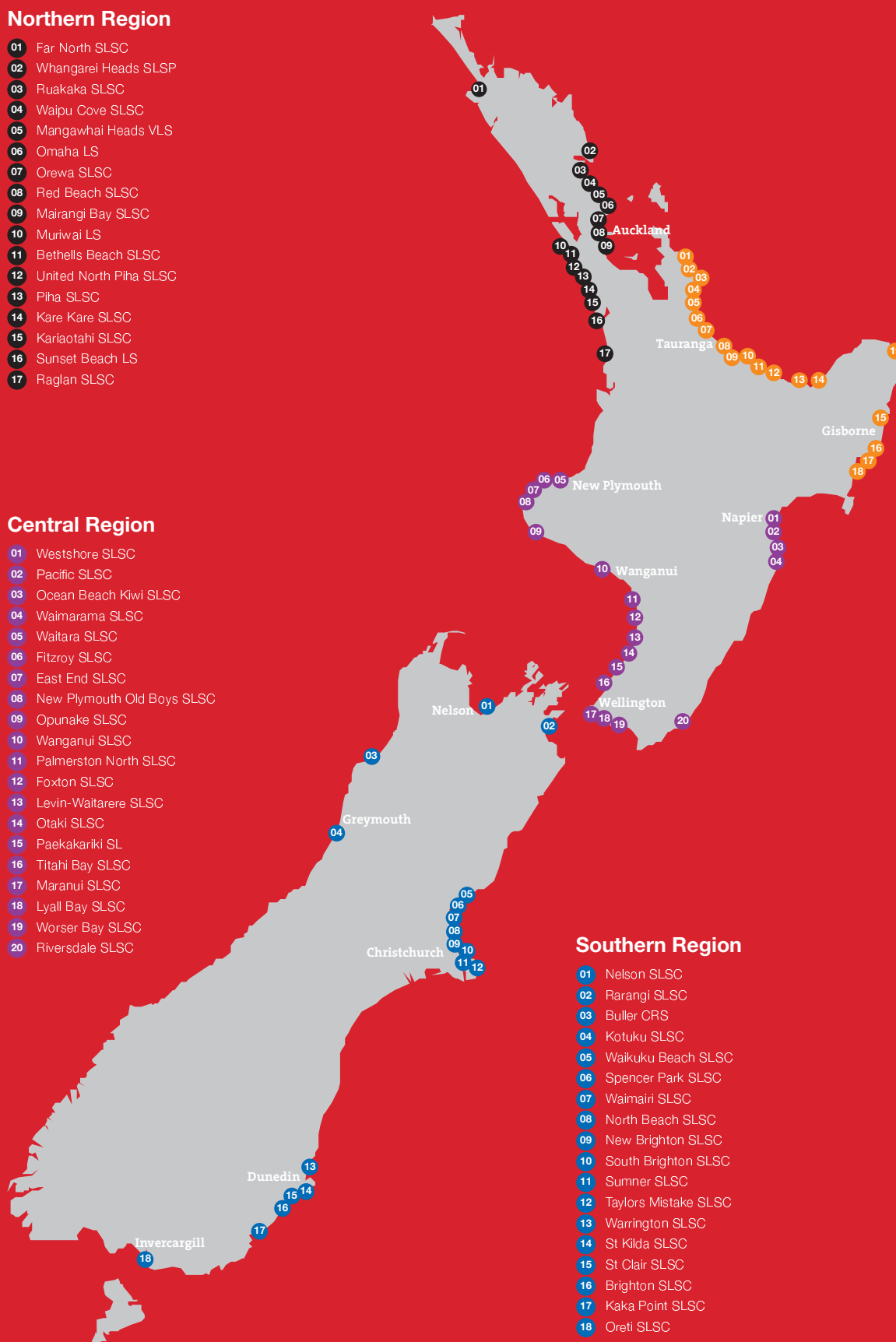

Regional Reports

Central Region Report

If you're a reader of these reports, it's possible you'll remember the context of a part of my note from last year. In that note I commented on the collaboration between Clubs that was evident within and throughout the Central Region's 21 Surf Clubs. On recent visits I find this is still evident, and in fact growing strong at a grass-roots level. Our lifeguards seem to have forgotten (or ignored) the attitude of a few of the old guard who need to continue to keep their brother/sister Club's in their bad books. Likewise, our club leadership teams practice an open and inclusive approach and actively support closer working relationships between the clubs. This is great to see and an admirable trait. It is a good example of people working together to achieve a common outcome, which is a success story in itself. Whether it's competing or lifeguarding, collaboration between the clubs is occurring in both areas, which has the result in bringing our lifeguards closer together and creating lasting friendships.

Looking further ahead, it's important our lifeguards are properly equipped to do their job on the beach and in the water, this coming season. Training in the use of the different rescue assets, is an important component of keeping the skill sets of our lifeguards current. Equally it is important that their First Aid quals are kept current. This in recent times has become a problem with a perceived lack of leadership, coordination and communication which brings to question the role of SLSNZ in effectively managing the provision of these courses. The rationale for coordination at this level seems obvious as it facilitates training across a large geographical area thereby maximising attendance and minimising cost. It also maintains a credible level of qualification in our lifeguards to perform resuscitation competently and deliver oxygen and operate AED's. Hopefully at the end of the 2019/2020 season, we will reflect on this aspect of training and acknowledge the previous season was an anomaly and that our level of qualified lifeguards in first aid is once again heading back to strong levels of qualification.

Hopefully, all Clubs are now fully operational with the standards of health and safety of their membership and visitors in mind. Although the law is somewhat vague as to whether or not organisations such as ours come under the Health and Safety at work regulations, it nonetheless is incumbent upon us all to operate our Clubs in a safe and considerate manner. This reminds us all to be aware of the likelihood of hazards or an event happening which could give rise to personal injury. We should also be mindful of the obligations we have to our younger members, that they remain safe whilst within our care. Being mindful of our responsibilities to operate in a safe manner will no doubt become even more important as our communities consider what is reasonable to expect from organisations such as ourselves. This all might seem unending, but if we work steadily toward these positive attributes, not only will we be well prepared, we'll also be seen as a strong example of a community organisation operating at the highest standards.

Eastern Region Report

The last 12 months has seen the Eastern Region consolidate and start to mature as a region in terms of processes, structures and outputs on the beach. This is evidenced by the extensive hours of community work that our lifeguards and active membership undertake to not only keep the community safe, but also the hours of surf lifesaving activity that support our lifeguarding service.

The Eastern Region Clubs have had a great year in terms of patrolling on the beach with a slight increase in patrolling hours to 64,000 plus for the 2018-2019 season. Our lifesaving model is starting to change to become more community need focused, this will in turn meet the continued growing demand and expectations that the region is experiencing. An exciting future lies ahead for the Eastern Region, with the completion of Coastal Risk Assessments in the Coromandel and Bay of Plenty Areas and the continued investment into the Radio Communications Network will see a further maturing of the region, our challenge is to integrate these into our operational models over the next 2 years. When it comes down the hard facts the 42,459 Preventative Actions that lifeguards completed within the Eastern Region are just as important as the 187 people rescued.

On the sport front, the Eastern Region Senior Champs were held at Gisborne's Midway Beach for the first time in the event's 45 year history. Although competitor numbers were down mainly due to the extra travel factor, Gisborne put on an absolute stunner with a mix of fantastic waves and challenging conditions throughout the weekend. A special mention must also go out to Eastland Community Trust, who went above and beyond to add value in terms of event promotion and live streaming of the finals package for the first time. Eastern Region Junior Events were as well supported as ever, the ERC Juniors that were held at Whangamata, also in very challenging surf conditions. Eastern Region clubs also put on a good show on the sport front with the Gisborne Area taking out the NZ Representative Challenge and Eastern Region Clubs taking of 3 of the 5 New Zealand Championship Events. This is a credit to the passion, systems and process around sport within the Eastern Region and its Clubs.

From a club and member development perspective there has again been strong interest from our members to improve their skills, the Eastern Region is very lucky to have a partner like Zespri on board whose financial support is targeted in this area. The importance of having a region that has the skills and members to meet the need, cannot be understated, this is where the Zespri support reduces the financial barrier to our members. The other major change in the club and member development space is that the Eastern Region Staff have been refocused by splitting the CORO/BOP role into 2 roles giving a more manageable workload to the CDO's, the focus moving forward will be assisting the clubs to continue to be healthy.

Northern Region Report

Lifeguarding

Patronage of beaches in the Northern Region continues to grow with an ever-diverse population using our coastline in increasingly different ways and for extended periods of time. This together with a hot summer saw some unprecedented numbers on our beaches and high demands on our patrols with some carrying out mass rescues. A very big thank you to the clubs who have altered their patrol times and dates to deliver services that align with the demands of the public using the beach. Our clubs are also needing to manage volunteer time carefully to ensure the average hours patrolled by lifeguards can be reduced whilst significantly increasing the overall patrol days and hours.

Beyond the excellent day to day lifeguarding work we have had some spectacular out of hours rescues. Lives saved in rescues at Bethells Beach and at Kariaotahi (in May in the dark) show the professionalism of our volunteers and the growing complexity of our roles. The number of after hours and winter call outs is increasing.

Lifesaving Facility Redevelopments

The rebuild of our lifesaving facilities continues to be a big focus for SLSNR requiring significant project governance, risk management and fundraising at both regional and club level. Red Beach completed redevelopment and opened their new facility in October 2018 and Sunset Beach has just commenced construction. Karekare are in the final phases of pre-construction and fundraising work.

Auckland Council has provided an additional \$3.7 million in funding support for the next three years for lifesaving facility redevelopments at Kariaotahi, United North Piha and Orewa with \$600,000 of support from Grassroots Trust for developments at Karekare, Kariaotahi and United North Piha. We acknowledge the extensive amount of work these projects take and how complex and demanding the construction process is.

Sporting Achievements

It has been another year for celebration on the sporting front for SLSNR with tremendous sporting participation and high performance. A highlight for the entire region was the NZ representative teams from Sunset Beach being crowned the first ever World IRB Champions at the Lifesaving World Championships in Australia, after edging out their closest rivals by 22 points. Mention must also be made of Danielle McKenzie who dominated at SLSNZ National Championships at Mt Maunganui winning nine gold medals and helping Mairangi Bay take out second place in the overall Club points.

Innovation and Technology

Innovative approaches and increasing use of technology are a key feature for Northern Region.

Our move to a digital radio network has not been without its challenges and we look forward to resolving coverage issues and building on the network's digital capability in the coming season. Northern Region benefits hugely from a region wide radio network and the central operations centre in Surf Comm.

The SafeSwim partnership between Auckland Council, Auckland District Health Board and SLSNR continues to deliver public health benefits to Auckland. Recent innovations now allow all members of the public to access live on-line beach information for Auckland patrolled locations. Water quality testing is now occurring at 152 beaches (102 in 2018) in readiness for the 2019 season. We are proud to be part of this award-winning programme.

Under the St Johns MDT initiative Surf Life Saving is pleased to be partnering with St John Ambulance in a co-responder relationship that supports Surf Life Saving responding to relevant rescue situations that are tasked to St John. In the past season this has allowed Surf Life Saving to support and deliver 64 operations managed through SurfComm with St Johns co-responding with lifeguards.

By December 2019 we are aiming for all patrols to be paperless through using our new 'Digi App'. The Surf Lifesaving Northern Region co-created technology will be used to remove the barriers in patrol reporting. Additionally it will help us save more lives by using data to assist with the St John co-response trial, training, re-training, accreditation and fundraising.

A volunteer led, volunteer funded community outreach and education programme delivered by Waipu Cove Surf Life Saving Club during the summer of 2018 – 2019 has worked to enhance public safety along our coastlines delivering beach safety and public education seminars to beachgoers visiting popular tourist spots in Northland. This campaign received amazing media attention and praise from local communities.

We are proud of our Northern Region Clubs and the way they are adapting and responding to the changing and growing needs of the region.

ADAM FRASER – FITZROY SURF LIFE SAVING CLUB

Adam has spent a massive amount of hours volunteering at club, regional and national level this year. He facilitated the refreshers for both the Surf Lifeguard and IRB awards at his club and provided support to the Club Captain and patrol captains. In addition to this he completed his own patrol hours at his home beach Fitzroy.

Regionally, Adam is the Taranaki chief examiner, patrol captain course facilitator, patrol auditor and member of the Local Lifesaving Committee. He also manages the Taranaki Call-Out Squad, managing the budget and all paperwork required as well as being an active part of the team. Adam organised and coordinated the SLS display at the Taranaki Rescue Helicopter Open Day and assisted with the SLS promotional stand at the 2018 Taranaki Run Amuck event.

Adam was a Senior Instructor at the National Lifeguard School and is the Chairperson of the National Life Saving Committee after being elected as the Central Region representative. He worked with the BP Leaders for Life group and SLSNZ staff to develop the rock rescue module which was rolled out earlier this year.

Adam has attended a number of Search and Rescue courses and continues to push himself to up-skill. He has worked with multiple Marine SAR agencies such as Police, MPI, Coastguard Air Patrol and Taranaki Rescue Helicopter in regional search and rescue exercises this year.

His dedication and commitment is a great example to all volunteers.

BP Surf Rescue of the Year 2018

WANGANUI SURF LIFE SAVING CLUB

Lifeguards involved: James Newell, Phil Gilmore, Matthew Newell, Laura O'Keeffe, Clarissa Nowak, Sophie Couper, Laurie Gil, Alex Forlong and Kaya Dobbie.

Just after midday on Sunday February 18, Wanganui Surf Life Saving Club Chairperson and lifeguard James Newell received a call from Police with reports of two swimmers missing off Kai Iwi Beach. They requested that the club deploy a search team from the beach.

Within 30 minutes, James had lifeguards Laura O'Keeffe and Alex Forlong on the water in an IRB assessing the situation. The surf was 30 minutes away from being a high, king tide and storm waves were reaching over two metres high with shore dumps smashing along the cliffs.

Fellow lifeguards Kaya Dobbie and Matthew Newell were stationed in the newly built watch tower, acting as the base of operations between lifeguards, Police and Coastguard. They communicated reports from Police to the IRB that the last sighting of the swimmers was when they went out directly from the Mowhanau Stream, which dragged them south of Kai Iwi. The lifeguards headed south in the IRB and quickly located them under the cliffs in a small cove, trying to get out from the smashing waves.

Experienced IRB driver Laura attempted to get in close and dropped crewman Alex into the water to collect the patients. She got in close enough to identify and check that they were ok but the storm surf was too powerful against the cliff and, in the process, Alex injured her hand against the rock and swam back to the IRB. They identified the patients as an adult male with his young teenage daughter who had an injured foot. The IRB then sat off the cliffs and kept a visual watch while James reassessed the situation from the communications base at the watch tower.

Police had called the rescue helicopter as an option to winch the patients out but lifeguards had decided to dispatch a second IRB from Castlecliff. The helicopter arrived at 1:30pm and they also deemed it too risky to try winch the patients out due to the storm surf and wind. The IRB was the only option.

At this time, the tide had slowed down, giving the lifeguards small, 30 second to two minute intervals with no shore dumps. They took the opportunity in a flat period to take an IRB into the cliffs and hide in the sets behind a slip which had formed a small island about 50 metres down from the patients.

Once in place, they waited for a second flat period when a second crewman Clarissa Nowak swam to the patients, rescuing the young girl and taking her back to the IRB. They waited for a further calm patch before returning to shore where the patient was carried to lifeguard Laurie Gil who was waiting with the ambulance and the girl's family. Meanwhile, lifeguards in the second IRB were using the same procedure to rescue the girl's father who was unharmed.

The whole operation utilised nine lifeguards, two IRBs, one ambulance, approximately eight Police officers, two fire engines and one helicopter. Their plan was formulated and they all followed it strictly with great courage in what were trying conditions. It was a very good outcome for the victims with the lifeguards receiving high praise from Police for a job well done.

Consolidated Notes to the Financial Statements

FOR YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE, 2019

1. Reporting Entity

Surf Life Saving New Zealand Incorporated (SLSNZ) is a New Zealand Incorporated Society formed under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908. SLSNZ is a charity registered under the Charities Act 2005.

These consolidated financial statements comprise SLSNZ and the Surf Life Saving New Zealand Foundation.

Surf Life Saving New Zealand Foundation is a registered Charitable Trust.

SLSNZ's principal activity is "To lead and support surf lifesaving in New Zealand". This remains unchanged during the period reported.

The financial statements are for the year ended 30 June 2019. The financial statements were authorised for issue by the Board on 23rd August 2019.

2. Basis of Preparation

Basis of Measurement

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis except for assets and liabilities that have been measured at fair value.

The accrual basis of accounting has been used unless otherwise stated and the financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

Presentation Currency

The financial statements are presented in New Zealand dollars and all values are rounded to the nearest dollar.

Statement of Compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with NZ GAAP as required under the Charities Act 2005.

SLSNZ is a public benefit not-for-profit entity and is eligible to apply Tier 2 not-for-profit PBE IPSAS on the basis that it does not have public accountability and is not defined as large.

SLSNZ is deemed to be a public benefit entity for financial reporting purposes, as its primary objective is to provide services to the community for social benefit and has been established with a view to supporting that primary objective rather than a financial return.

The board has elected to report in accordance with Tier 2 not-for-profit PBE accounting standards and in doing so has taken advantage of all applicable Reduced Disclosure (RDR) disclosure concessions.

Changes in Accounting Policy

All accounting policies have been applied on a consistent basis with the prior year.

3. Significant Accounting Policies

The significant accounting policies used in the preparation of these financial statements, set out below, have been applied consistently to all years presented in these financial statements.

The significant accounting policies used in the preparation of these financial statements are summarised below:

a) Foreign Currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are converted at the New Zealand rate of exchange ruling at the date of the transaction.

At balance date foreign monetary assets and liabilities are translated at the closing rate and exchange variations arising from these are included in the Income Statement.

b) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and the short-term deposits in the balance sheet comprise cash on hand, cash at bank and short-term deposits with time to maturity of three months or less.

c) Financial Instruments

Financial instruments and financial liabilities are recognised when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instruments.

Financial Assets

The Entity's financial assets include: cash and cash equivalents, receivables from non-exchange transactions and receivables from exchange transactions.

The Entity derecognises a financial asset or, where applicable, a part of an asset or part of an Entity of similar financial assets when the rights to receive cash flows from the asset have expired or are waived, or the Entity has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from the asset or has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows in full without material delay to a party; and either:

- the Entity has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset; or
- the Entity has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, but has transferred control of the asset.

All financial assets are subject to review for impairment at least at each reporting date. Financial assets are impaired when there is any objective evidence that a financial asset or Entity of financial assets is impaired.

Financial liabilities

The Entity's liabilities include Creditors and other payables (excluding GST and PAYE), employee benefits, and income in advance (in respect to grants whose conditions are yet to be complied with).

All financial liabilities are initially recognised at fair value (plus transaction cost for financial liabilities not at fair value (through surplus or deficit)), and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method except for financial liabilities at fair value through surplus or deficit.

Measurement of financial assets

• **Loans and Receivables**

Receivables are stated at their estimated realisable value less any provision for doubtful debts. Loans and receivables are financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. After initial recognition these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any provision for impairment.

• **Cash and Cash Equivalents**

Cash and Cash equivalents are measured at their fair values.

Measurement of financial liabilities

• **Accounts Payables and other payables**

Account payables and other borrowings are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

d) Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost or net realisable value, determined on a first-in first-out basis. An allowance for obsolescence has been assessed where appropriate. Inventories include uniforms, resource manuals and other surf lifesaving equipment that is on sold to Clubs or used for promotional purposes from time to time.

e) Property, Plant and Equipment

All property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses.

• **Depreciation**

Depreciation is provided on all tangible assets on a straight line basis that will write off the cost of the assets over their estimated useful lives:

Office Furniture and Equipment	3-10 years
Computers and Electronic Equipment	3 years
Event Equipment	3-5 years
Vehicles	5 years
Radio Network	10 years
Buildings	50 years

f) Intangible Assets

SLSNZ have numerous registered trademarks which have benefit to SLSNZ and are stated at cost less amortisation in the financial statements.

Amortisation is provided on all intangible assets on a straight basis that will write off the cost of the asset over the estimated useful lives.

The estimated useful life of the intangibles asset is 10 years.

g) Work in Progress

Work in progress is valued on the basis of expenditure incurred during the financial year and is not depreciated.

The total cost of the project is transferred to the relevant asset class on its completion and then it is depreciated.

h) Impairment

The carrying values of non-financial assets are reviewed for impairment when events or changes in circumstances indicate the carrying value may not be recoverable. If any such indication exists and where the carrying values exceed the estimated recoverable amount, the assets are written down to their recoverable amount. Any impairment losses are recognised in the income statement.

i) Leases

Lease costs relating to operating leases are recognised on a straight-line basis over the life of the lease. Finance leases, which effectively transfer to SLSNZ substantially all the risks and benefits of ownership of the leased assets, are capitalised at the lower of the leased asset's fair value or the present value of the minimum lease payments at inception of the lease. The leased assets and corresponding liabilities are recognised and the leased assets are depreciated over their estimated useful lives.

j) Employee Entitlements

• **Short Term Employee Benefits**

Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within 12 months of reporting date are accrued and measured based on accrued entitlements at current rates of pay.

These include salaries and wages accrued up to the reporting date and annual leave earned, but not yet taken at the reporting date.

k) Provisions

A provision is recognised as a liability when the settlement amount or timing is uncertain; when there is a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of a past event; it is probable that expenditures will be required to settle the obligation; and a reliable estimate of the potential settlement can be made.

Provisions are not recognised for future operating losses.

l) Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefit will flow to the entity and revenue can be reliably measured.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of consideration received.

Revenue is derived from two broad categories - revenue from exchange transactions and revenue from non-exchange transactions.

Exchange transactions are transactions in which one entity receives assets or services, or has liabilities extinguished, and directly gives approximately equal value (primarily in the form of cash, goods, services or use of assets) to another entity in exchange.

Non-exchange transactions are transactions that are not exchange transactions. In a non-exchange transactions, an entity either receives value from another entity without directly giving approximately equal value in exchange, or gives value to another entity without directly receiving approximately equal value in exchange.

The following specific recognition criteria must be met before revenue is recognised.

Revenue from Exchange Transactions

- **Sale of Goods**

Revenue from sale of goods is recognised when the entity has transferred to the buyer the significant risks and rewards of ownership of the goods supplied. Significant risks and rewards are generally considered to be transferred to the buyer when the customer has taken delivery of the goods.

- **Sponsorship**

Sponsorship is recognised as revenue when received and all associated obligations have been met. Sponsorship received for which the requirements and services have not been met are treated as 'income in advance' under current liabilities.

Revenue from Non-exchange transactions

- **Donations and Grants**

Donations and Grants are recognised as revenue when received and all associated obligations have been met. Where grants have been given for a specific purpose, or with conditions attached, income is not recognised until agreed upon services and conditions have been satisfied.

Revenue received for which the requirements and services have not been met are treated as "income in advance" under current liabilities.

m) Income Tax

SLSNZ has Charitable Status from Inland Revenue for income tax purposes. There is no requirement to provide for income tax.

n) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

All figures are stated exclusive of GST except receivables and payables which are stated inclusive of GST.

o) Basis of Consolidation

The Consolidation financial statements consolidate those of Surf Life Saving New Zealand and Surf Life Saving New Zealand Foundation.

SLSNZ controls the Foundation as SLSNZ has the power to govern the financial and operating policies of the Foundation so as to obtain benefits from the Foundation activities.

All transactions between SLSNZ and the Foundation are eliminated on consolidation.

4. Income and Expenditure

The financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2018 have been reported on a function basis, with expenditure allocated on a factual or allocation basis where practical. This includes employment related expenditure, telephone and tolls, freight, postage and travel.

Independent auditor's report

To the Members of Surf Life Saving New Zealand Incorporated

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Surf Life Saving New Zealand Incorporated Group on pages 1 to 11, which comprise the consolidated statement of financial position as at 30 June 2019, and the consolidated statement of comprehensive revenue and expenses, consolidated statement of changes in net assets and consolidated statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and the statement of accounting policies and notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Opinion section of our report the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Surf Life Saving New Zealand Incorporated as at 30 June 2019, and the financial performance and the cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Public Benefit Entity Standards Reduced Disclosure Regime (PBE Standards RDR).

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with similar organisations, controls over cash prior to being recorded are limited and there are no practical audit procedures to determine the effect of these limited controls. Controls over the collection, processing and receipting of donations undertaken by a third-party organisation were not independently verified and were outside the scope of the engagement.

The effect of these limitations meant we were unable to determine or verify by alternate means the completeness of donations reported as \$154,214 and direct mail receipts reported as \$294,449 within fundraising income in the consolidated statement of comprehensive revenue and expenses. As a result of this matter, the scope of our audit was limited, and we were unable to determine whether any adjustment might have been found necessary in respect of the recorded or unrecorded donations and other receipts had we been able to obtain sufficient evidence these items.

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (New Zealand) (ISAs (NZ)). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the 'Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements' section of our report.

We are independent of Surf Life Saving New Zealand Incorporated in accordance with Professional and Ethical Standard 1 (Revised) 'Code of ethics for assurance practitioners' issued by the New Zealand Auditing and Assurance Standards Board, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Other than our capacity as auditor we have no relationship with, or interests in, Surf Life Saving New Zealand Incorporated.

Other Matter

In respect of the financial statements of the prior period we were unable to confirm or verify by alternate means the completeness of donations recorded as \$204,295 and direct mail receipts recorded as \$254,891 within fundraising income in the consolidated statement of comprehensive revenue and expenses. This was because controls over cash prior to being recorded were limited and there were no practical audit procedures to determine the effect of those limited controls. That audit report was issued on 24 August 2018.

In preparing the financial statements, the Board are responsible on behalf of Surf Life Saving New Zealand Incorporated for assessing Surf Life Saving New Zealand Incorporated's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Board either intend to liquidate Surf Life Saving New Zealand Incorporated or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (NZ) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

Obituaries - SLSNZ Life Members

John Porter – Paekakariki – 19 March 2019

John (JP) was a Life Member of Paekakariki Surf lifeguards, Wellington District and Surf Life Saving New Zealand. He contributed a huge amount to the club, district and SLSNZ as well as his local community.

John spent over 50 years in the club and in that time took almost every role on the club committee. He was a long standing judge for Wellington Association and SLSNZ. JP had a passion for IRB's and racing and was a driving force in bringing these boats to the club.

Graham Cullen – Waihi Beach Surf Club - 2 May 2019

“Cully” was a long servant and life member of Waihi Beach Surf Lifesaving Club, joining as a 12-year-old in 1970 and qualifying as a lifeguard two years later.

He patrolled, competed, instructed, officiated, managed and governed in an illustrious lifesaving career, while also working as a school teacher, polytechnic tutor and chartered accountant.

He joined Mount Lifeguard Service as a member in 2004, the same year he was elected Chairman of Surf Life Saving New Zealand, after five years on the board.

He was made a life member of SLSNZ in 2012, spent time as a delegate on the New Zealand Water Safety Council and later, was New Zealand's delegate to the International Life Saving Federation, where he also served as Board member.

But to the core, he was a lifeguard; someone who fought fiercely to prevent loss of life on our beaches.

Friends and club mates remember his passion for surf, the easy and constant smile, his patience and dedication.

Eion Waugh – Lyall Bay – 4 July 2019

Eion began his surf life saving career with Wellington's Island Bay Club. He was also member of Worser Bay SLSC, and most recently Lyall Bay SLSC. Eion took various positions on the clubs and district committees and was very involved in other community activities.

An R&R man, Eion was a regular in Island Bay March Past teams as a coach and National judge. He had a long career as a District and SLSNZ Official. Eion was a Wellington District and SLSNZ Life member, and obtained his 50 year badge in 1998.

Graeme Crombie – SLSNZ Board Member - 13 February 2019

Graham Crombie, one of our inaugural Independent Appointed Board Members, passed away unexpectedly while still in office, following complications from surgery in Dunedin at the far too young age of 55.

Graham set the bar very high with his contribution to SLSNZ over his five years on the Board, and left very big shoes to fill, for SLSNZ and the many other organisations he was active with.

Graham chaired the SLSNZ Audit & Risk Committee and led a lot of the Board's strategy work. He will be sorely missed.

Corporate Report

2018/19 has seen some significant milestones reached for Surf Life Saving New Zealand (SLSNZ) and our commercial partners. We have entered our 51st year in our Major Partnership with BP and celebrate our “sweet 16th” with Major Partner DHL. We are thrilled that Major Partner TSB have re-signed their agreement for another 3 years and we have welcomed Toyota Financial Services as a new Major Partner to our family of SLSNZ partners.

In addition to this, Gold Partner, Zespri have re-signed for another 3 years and we have also welcomed new Silver Partner, NZ Uniforms, who supply our Surf Lifeguard uniforms and SLSNZ event merchandise.

Bronze Partners, Bed Bath & Beyond and Under Armour have both renewed their agreements for 2 years.

All of our partners are incredibly proud of the work that our volunteer Surf Lifeguards and clubs do and the renewal and signing of new partners is testimony to this. In addition to providing valuable income to surf lifesaving, our partners have also continued to provide opportunities, prizes and income to our clubs and members.

We are truly grateful and thank them for everything they do to help us support our clubs and members.

Major Partners

Our 51-year partnership with BP continues to be the longest unbroken commercial partnership in New Zealand, and we are both incredibly proud of this.

BP committed to repeating the highly popular “Every Litre Counts” campaign this season raising an additional \$218,000+ funds for SLSNZ. The campaign also enabled our clubs to share videos of critical safety messaging across Aotearoa with \$50,000 worth of cash prizes as an incentive. There was an incredibly strong Surf Life Saving presence at BP sites and across various media channels throughout the summer.

With Inflatable Rescue Boats (IRB's) being an essential rescue resource, BP launched “Vote the Boat” giving clubs the opportunity to win a fully kitted IRB. The lucky recipient was Wainui Surf Life Saving Club who incidentally utilised this IRB in a daring rescue on Boxing Day in Gisborne preventing what would have been a terrible tragedy. BP also came to the rescue of Ngati Porou SLSC this past season by providing a new IRB that will improve the capability of this club and help them to respond to incidents along the lengthy East Coast.

BP are also the naming rights partner for our IRB National Championships which enables our volunteer lifeguards to not only compete in a sporting environment, but the opportunity to hone their IRB rescue skills.

BP continued their recognition of lifesaving excellence through BP Rescue of the Month and BP Rescue of the Year - we congratulate all clubs and members for their efforts. BP Leaders for Life – our leadership development programme – continues to go from strength to strength providing our members with a fantastic opportunity for personal development and to make a valued contribution to the growth of surf lifesaving in New Zealand.

All clubs once again benefitted at the start of the season with a \$500 BP gift card to help with running costs. It's been another massive year for our partnership with BP and we sincerely thank them for their phenomenal support.

With a renewed agreement and the focus to help Surf Lifesaving “drive safer beaches,” DHL launched the DHL Spot the Danger campaign this summer which promoted our key beach safety messages through digital gaming. Participants had to spot the dangers on a virtual beach with the added pressure of having to do it in a limited timeframe – similar to our volunteer Surf Lifeguards. This interactive tool was a very clever tool designed to engage the public and raise awareness and hopefully change behaviours towards keeping safer on New Zealand beaches. The winner received \$2500 cash and another \$2500 was awarded to their club of choice – Maketu SLSC was the lucky recipient.

It has been an action-packed 3 years with major partner TSB and we are delighted that this will continue for another 3 years building upon a solid and successful foundation.

TSB continued their commitment of \$100,000 directly to our surf lifesaving clubs by way of the TSB Surf Lifesaving Grants. 11 clubs will receive their share of \$100,000 through the TSB club grants application process with recipients to be announced in September.

In addition to this, TSB committed to supporting Surf Life Saving in heavily promoting and spreading vital safety messaging around how to stay “rip safe.” With their creative agencies, TSB helped SLSNZ to develop the highly impactful and memorable “3R's of Rip Safety.” With rips being the number one cause of beach and coastal incidents, this campaign was instrumental in equipping the public with critical information in surviving a rip – RELAX and float, RAISE your hand to signal for help and RIDE the rip until you can swim back to shore safely. Early research indicates that this messaging has had a positive effect already.

Gold Partners

KFC kick-started the 2018/2019 patrol season with a fantastic commercial featuring our very own Surf Lifeguards to promote the “Burger Bundle” with \$1 per bundle donated to SLSNZ. Following a successful trial, in conjunction with KFC we launched our ‘tap to donate’ cashless donation units across Aotearoa to provide their customers with an innovative way to support Surf Life Saving.

We are delighted that our partnership with Zespri has been renewed and will continue to provide free training and upskilling to Surf Lifeguards throughout the Eastern Region. Thanks to Zespri scholarships, eight Surf Lifeguards from the Eastern Region attended the National Lifeguard School and four candidates completed the BP Leaders for Life programme at no cost. The Zespri Club of the Year awards saw Waikanae, Mt Maunganui and Waihi Beach each win \$5,000 to spend on new lifesaving equipment at their respective Zespri Bay of Plenty/ Coromandel and Zespri Gisborne Tairāwhiti, Awards of Excellence.

Silver Partners

We welcomed new Silver Partner, NZ Uniforms to the surf lifesaving family and look forward to this relationship developing.

Our Surf Life Saving sunscreen, made by Zenith Distribution, had another strong year of sales and after performing extremely well in the Consumer NZ testing during last summer.

Kubota continue to support our sports events by providing RTVs and tractors all summer and continue to donate \$100 to SLSNZ for every RTV sold in New Zealand.
