

Instructions

1. Print these puzzles out and cut them up.
2. Instructors then need to muddle up the puzzle pieces.
3. Place the pictures and definitions upside down on a table or floor.
4. In groups of 2-4, candidates take turns flipping one card over at a time. The aim of this activity is to match the picture with the definition of what each signal is showing.
5. Share back to the whole group and make any adjustments where needed.

Fly this red flag from your clubhouse in place of the patrol flag when sea conditions are too dangerous to designate a patrolled area on the beach

Placed on the beach to indicate there are jellyfish present either in the water or on the beach

Warning – Sharks

Used when there is a shark sighting

Warning – Strong currents

Placed on the beach to indicate to beach-goers that there are strong currents present

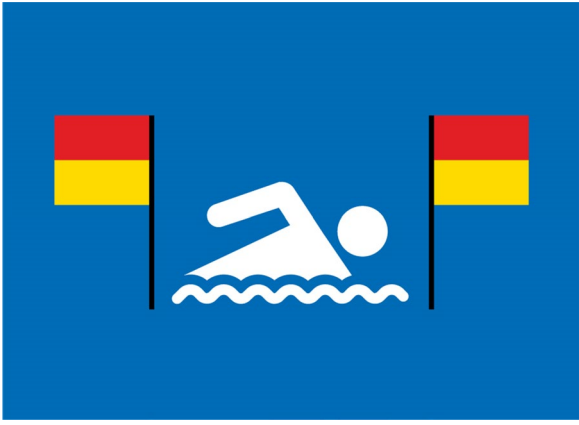
**Warning – Swimming
not advised**

Used to indicate swimming is not advised in the indicated area. If the surf is too dangerous to set out patrol flags, then these signs are placed on the beach along with the danger flag.

Swim between the flags sign

Used together with the patrol flag, this flag indicates surf lifeguard patrolled areas. Swim between flags sign can also be used separately at beach access ways and other areas to indicate where the flagged area is.
