Cyclone Gabrielle struck Hawke's Bay in the early hours of 14 February 2023, with rising flood waters trapping people on roofs, landslides destroying homes and critical infrastructure, and cutting entire regions off. Prime Minister Chris Hipkins said, "the severity and the damage that we are seeing has not been experienced in a generation."

When the call went out for help, 80 surf lifeguards from various regions including Wellington, Kāpiti Coast, Horowhenua, Manawatū, Whanganui, and Hawke's Bay responded swiftly.

They worked in some of the most severely impacted areas, such as Eskdale and Bayview, where they successfully rescued over 200 individuals and aided more people and pets to safety. *For crews in inflatable rescue boats (IRB), the *conditions on the water were nothing like anyone had experienced before, with surf lifeguards having to duck under power lines and navigate hazards and debris to retrieve people from rooftops and return them safely to land.

It was a demanding time for all those involved as they carried out complex rescues, many leaving their worried friends and whānau behind, but they did it with courage and determination, and with the care and safety of people always front-of-mind.



Lifesaving Sport Awards



This year, TSB marked eight years of parthership with SLSNZ, and we hope our support has made a huge impact in raising public awareness about water safety and supporting the vital work of surf lifeguards.

This season, surf lifeguards around the motu were tested as they responded to emergencies away from the red and yellow flags. Boyd Harris Pukehina SR

Boyd is the perfect example of the Surf Life Saving motto 'In It For Life' as his commitment spans many decades.

After first obtaining his Surf Lifeguard Award in 1983, Boyd quickly moved through the ranks by qualifying as an instructor in 1988 and a surf lifeguard and IRB examiner in 1995.

Since then, Boyd has continued to thrive and upskill. His Regional Service includes current Bay of Plenty Chief Surf Lifeguard Examiner and acting Chief IRB Examiner, along with being an instructor for other programmes, such as Rock Rescue and Wāhine on Water. Boyd is currently a SAR call out squad member and sits on the Bay of Plenty Lifeguard and Bay of Plenty Chairs Committee. Boyd's also been a club instructor, cadets coach, and sport coach for 35 years.
